The 2021/22 resolution A call to increase awareness of the subtle signs of ovarian cancer was passed with a majority of 99.48%. This means it is now an NFWI mandate

and will form the basis of a national WI campaign which all members are invited to work on.

We recognise that the pandemic may have led to additional considerations around engaging with WIs this year, so we want to take this opportunity to thank you for all of your hard work supporting members and obtaining their votes.

NFWI's Public Affairs team will be producing a full campaign action pack with ideas and resources that members can use to take the campaign forward.
