


The closing date for resolutions to be submitted to NFWI is **9 September 2022**.

On Tuesday 19th July 2022 the UK recorded its highest ever temperature as 40.3C (104F).

The impact of extreme weather events caused by climate change is literally hitting home. This is not like the summer of 1976, every part of our planet is now affected and the natural world is in crisis.

In June 2019 the Government committed to reaching net-zero carbon emissions by 2050 in order to keep the global surface temperature increase below 1.5C. Dr Jonathan Foyle is a former Curator at Hampton Court and currently presents Channel 5's Secrets of the Royal Palaces. He is also a lecturer and researcher.

He is author of seven books on cathedrals, great churches and castles, and has spent a decade researching medieval furniture, a journey of discovery sparked by the subject of his talk.

In 2010 an antique bed appeared on an auction listing. Its ancient timber and arcane language led to a decade of research to uncover its identity. Those trials, tribulations and triumphs led their way to a Queen called Elizabeth. The bed, rich in medieval royal imagery, was made for Elizabeth of York and Henry VII in time for their marriage in January 1486. But what was uncovered to make the case? Jonathan will reveal all in his talk *Elizabeth, Queen of England: the Marriage Bed of Henry VII and Elizabeth of York*.
