New campaign! Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife

The Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife resolution passed the 2023 Annual Meeting with a majority of 84%.

Our new resolution urges WI members, the wider public, local authorities and Government to make, support and promote applications for appropriate stretches of our rivers to be designated as bathing waters. Once designated as a bathing water, the Environment Agency and water companies are under a duty to test waters for bacteria levels, and to improve the condition of the waterway.

Sudbury Town Council and the River Stour Trust have joined forces and are petitioning for designated bathing water status for the River Stour between the Granary Cut in Sudbury and the Great Cornard Lock.


Green Actions Survey

- Recycling
- Energy consumption



Results indicate that WI members are doing a great job with many of the green actions.

DENMAN UPDATE FROM NFWI

We know WI members have been waiting for an announcement about what is next for Denman, following the sale of the college. We have been working hard behind the scenes to develop a new model that works for our members today, a model which is inclusive, flexible, and accessible for all our members

When Denman was opened in 1948 it was innovative and filled an identified gap. In 2023 we face the same challenge to ensure the legacy lives on.

Our fundamental vision of the new model is one that offers free online education to WI members, making it more convenient and accessible for all. This means our online Denman at Home offer will continue as it is today, but with no costs for WI members!

In addition, to support the continuation of in-person education, but not fixed in one physical location, we will offer grants to federations to regionally expand the WI's educational network which can be accessed without significant travel or personal expense.

We are now completing the final stage of the Charity Commission consultation, which includes a public notice of the intention to use funds, and the details of where you can share your feedback. The proposal is that we release £2.75m of the proceeds of the sale to fund this new educational model. This will leave the remaining funds (£4 m) in permanent endowment accruing interest and ensuring a sustainable future for the Denman Trust. For further information visit: www.thewi.org.uk/denman

Hundon WI Our June meeting was an afternoon visit to Ashdon Museum. Curated by Glen Miller, who started collecting objects as a young schoolboy and built up quite a collection over the years. By 1995 it was decided the collection should be safeguarded for the future and became Ashdon Village Museum.

From the moment you step inside you are transported back in time. Each exhibit tells a story and we all recognised items that parents or grandparents had owned!

Top of my list of displays had to be memorabilia from Ashdon WI, formed in 1918. It included a membership card, programmes, badges, a tablecloth to mark the 1953 Coronation and an exquisitely embroidered verse of Jerusalem. A

photograph of an outing to the coast by Charabanc, which became an annual event in 1926, leaves no doubt in my mind that the ladies of Ashdon WI knew how to have a good time!!

Horringer & Ickworth WI What a fascinating evening we had with beachcomber Kate from Beach Bonkers.

We learned how lucky we are with the wealth of material to be found on our Suffolk beaches, Orford Ness in particular, being one of only five rare shingle beaches in Europe - so, very special. Best time to hunt is in Winter, when the beach is quiet and high tides bring in the treasures, Kate reminding us of items we could take as keepsakes and those best left to provide food and shelter for other marine animals.

From the wealth of her collection we were able to handle a mermaids' purse and whelk eggs as well as a whale ear, shark's teeth (surprisingly small), sea poppy, sea cabbage root and, Kate's favourite, a porpoise vertebrae. But the most aweinspiring was a fossilised sea sponge which was 80 million years old! More soberingly she showed us examples of plastic found on our beaches together with photos of the pitiful damage inflicted on marine wildlife by this. Such an energetic, enthusiastic and inspiring speaker - shame she is soon to retire to pursue her other ecological interests.

Moreton Hall WI We were so lucky that Mary Newton was able to step in at the last minute for our June meeting. You may remember an article about Mary in the April edition of WI Life. Mary was a London-based forensic pathologist for forty years. She worked on some very highprofile cases that you may have heard of, such as the murder of Stephen Lawrence and the Night Stalker attacks. Her riveting talk entitled 'Blood, Sweat and Fears' covered a variety of topics such as the power of DNA profiling and blood pattern analysis.

Contrary to public perception, Mary assured us that forensic science is not a male dominated profession. Women are well represented and successful in the field because they tend to be tenacious and meticulous – both qualities that make for good forensic scientists. By the end of the evening, she had certainly proved the point. Her talk was absolutely fascinating, and I suspect that most of us will never look at Sellotape in the same way!

Rickinghall WI Our June meeting speaker was Sarah Clark from Suffolk Recycling. Suffolk Recycling deal with our domestic waste as well as the eleven recycling centres across Suffolk.

Suffolk recycles Sarah told us what can and can't be recycled in our home recycling bins and the importance of washing containers so any left over contents don't contaminate paper, cardboard etc and make them non-recyclable.

We also learnt that waste from our black bins is not sent to landfill but instead sent to giant furnaces where it is burnt, and the contents from our brown bins is turned into compost.

Larger items can be recycled at local recycling centres. You can find a full list of items here <u>www.suffolkrecyling.org.uk</u> and if you require assistance unloading this can also be arranged.

Bury St Edmunds' recycling centre has a Reuse shop where you can donate items suitable to be re-sold. These will be tested and cleaned before being put on sale. It's also the ideal place to grab a bargain! The money raised goes to the Benjamin Foundation which provided emotional wellbeing support for children and young people.

Sarah finished her talk with a quiz about recycling which was won after a tie-break question by Jackie Arnold.

In May we recommenced our Tea and Chats at the new café in Botesdale. Our June session was held at Wortham Tea Room, when again we enjoyed a lively chat over tea and cakes.
