the shortlist and the resolution they would like to see go forward to the NFWI 2021 Annual Meeting.

The NFWI Board of Trustees has decided to put forward the top resolution to the Annual Meeting. The wording of the resolution is as follows, A call to increase awareness of the subtle signs of ovarian cancer: Every two hours in the UK someone dies of ovarian cancer. Making sure GPs and the public know what to look for will not only ensure the early detection and treatment of this disease but transform lives today and for generations to come. NFWI calls on WI members everywhere to help increase awareness of the subtle signs of ovarian cancer.

What happens next?

Members now have the opportunity to learn more and to discuss the resolution in their WIs before deciding how their WI should vote. The Federation plan to hold a virtual discussion session with guest speakers, so keep an eye out in the Hive!

How does my WI cast our vote?

All WIs get one vote – for or against the resolution. Voting will take place after the 2021 NFWI Annual Meeting. WIs will have time before and after the Annual Meeting in June to consider how they wish to vote. The voting will take place via an online form. More guidance on how WIs can cast their vote online will be circulated in due course.

Memories of Horringer & Ickworth WI Jill

O'Kelly has been a member of Horringer & Ickworth WI for over 40 years, but this month she will be moving to Princes Risborough to be closer to her family. Their March WI newsletter was dedicated to Jill, who has served as President and Treasurer during her time at Horringer and Ickworth, as well as serving up plenty of fun and frolics too. Jill shares just some of her wonderful WI memories with us...

"Where do I start? Looking back I realise that one of the most important things I did when we moved to Horringer in 1975 was to join the WI. I wanted to meet people outside the 'young mums' and by joining WI I met some wonderful ladies who taught me so much. Within a year I was on the committee and somehow ended up as Treasurer (or more correctly Bill, my husband, did), I think there is an unwritten WI motto to catch people before they have learnt to say no. I persuaded friends to join and soon there was a group of the 'young ones', as we were referred to. At that time Federation had a good Drama Committee which ran shows and competitions and we were there in the thick of it. I had never considered, with good reason, a career on the stage but no-one was spared and I can proudly claim to have been the back and the front end of a cow.

The Federation had a table tennis league at one time which we entered. As we didn't have our own table we initially played at Horringer House in their large hall. We had a very definite home advantage as the table had a 'dead spot' where the ball just stopped and it took our opponents some time to catch on. We eventually acquired our own table and moved to the hall and I was demoted to reserve as I was deemed, quite rightly, not quite good enough for the A team.

My daughter, Helen, who was born in 1977, was very much a WI child. She helped at coffee mornings and lunches basking in the glory of being told how sweet she was. She also had to sit

through rehearsals for shows which must have been boring but she just took it for granted that was what happened when your Mother was in the WI. One year the Federation did an arena event at the Suffolk Show and both the children were there to celebrate free school milk for children, which had been a WI resolution. I was the back end of a cow of course.

The Federation also used to organise some wonderful holidays abroad and Shirley and I had some great times. Over 80 WI ladies in the same hotel in New York as a group of some 120 firemen from Tyne and Weir was something to be remembered! When we went to the South of France Shirley had just had an operation on her foot and was on crutches and in a wheel chair, but that didn't hold us back and the wheel chair was handy when we got to the duty free warehouse at Calais.

I feel sad that young women in the village today cannot be persuaded to join WI, it has so much to offer for everyone and the opportunities are there to be taken. In fact I would say the WI is more important than ever for women to go and be themselves and have a break from juggling work and family commitments. It is far more than going to a meeting and listening to a talk once a month (oh heady days) it is the confidence it gives you being part of a supportive community and I know I

would never have had the nerve to stand up and be President."
